What makes Tango, Tango?

This series of three lectures explore the uniqueness of tango from a musical and historical perspective. In order to understand Tango's singularity, we go back to the history of the society and culture that produced it first, problematizing when and why Tango, a music and dance born at the "encounter" of different cultural flows in the Rio de la Plata, became the "authentic" music of Argentina.

THE CLASSES

We contextualize and analyze tango music in dialogue with other musical genres. What makes it distinctive and different? What Stravinsky, Kurt Weill, Frank Sinatra or Lady Gaga have to do with Carlos Gardel, Polaco Goyeneche, Julio de Caro or Juan D'Arienzo? What was the role of the cultural industry, the era of mass culture, and the competition with Jazz and Folklore music, in making Tango the "national" music of Argentina? How can we understand Tango at the encounter of local and transnational forces? How was it influenced by global historical processes and musical trends, how it traveled abroad, and how those dialogues constantly remade Tango?

Combining our expertises as professional musicians and historians from Argentina, the lectures combine a dynamic format that includes live music performances and examples, videos, pictures, music scores and original historical research. This program is for dancers, musicians or simply Tango lovers who are interested in knowing all the secrets about this style. It offers different topics that look at Tango from an original perspective that brings to the audience a serious approach to tango. Rather than taking it for granted, we seek to uncover Tango's history and originality.



Leandro Benmergui

Historian (University of Buenos Aires; PhD University of Maryland, College Park). Assistant Professor of History at Purchase College, State University of New York. Chair of the Latin American, Caribbean and Latinx Studies. Director of Casa Purchase, an Outreach Center. His work combines a history of Latin American cities and societies in the twentieth century from a transnational and socio-cultural perspective. He has published extensively in different academic journals and is currently working on his manuscript, a history of housing, modernization, and developmentalism in Buenos Aires and Rio de Janeiro (1950s-1970s) in the cold-war context.



Emiliano Messiez

Pianist and composer (University of the Arts and The School of Popular Music in Buenos Aires, Argentina). Assistant Professor of Counterpoint, Harmony and Music History at the University of the Arts in Buenos Aires. Emiliano has performed around the world in the most prestigious venues such as Lincoln Center and The Metropolitan Museum in New York, among many others. As teacher he has been giving lectures and work shops for many years. He has been awarded by The United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization, UNESCO for his album "Silencio" recorded with the José Luis Infantino Group.
